

Interesting History

In this beautifully produced map, Mortier primarily shows the route of the annual Spanish treasure fleet, or *flota*, as it entered and then left the Caribbean Sea. The Spaniards ran such a *flota*, or massive convoy, from the mid-sixteenth century to the late eighteenth century. The fleet might number as many as fifty large vessels, and after entering the Caribbean north of Trinidad; it called at Bahamas Channel, using the Gulf Stream on its way back to Spain.

This fleet was critical to the Spanish Crown for its yearly supply first of gold and then of silver, obtained primarily from mines in Peru and Mexico. Various other European powers did their best to intercept the *flota*, but its strength was such that on only two occasions, in 1628 and 1702, were its treasure ships captured, in each case by the Dutch. Sometimes, of course, ships were lost to the sea, and twentieth-century treasure hunters have recovered many of these vessels.
